# TVDA Annual General Meeting – June 2020 Presidents Report

#### Good evening everyone

What a year this has been on various fronts but I have to reinforce here the huge amount of gratitude and compliments that I pay to you all for your understanding, your commitment and also the resolve that you have all shown to make sure that the right outcomes are achieved, and also that the facts are known.

I start this with the Firearms Amendment Act that we are still waiting to see go to Parliament for its third and final reading. Many of you as members have been very active and financially supportive through the submission process, via Colfo and the select committee hearings to highlight the huge wrongs and injustices that this government and their 'puppets' have dished up to us all as lawful and law abiding citizens.

# Speaker for July Club Night And NOW also our Annual Prizegiving Evening START TIME 7.00PM

Don't miss out on what will be an excellent night at TVDA – a top quality speaker, a great chance to have a good catch up post Covid and share in the many and varied successes at TVDA via the presentation of our annual trophies.

Here is some of Steve's blurb and a couple of photos that will give you a snippet of an insight into what we have in store for you at the dinner and prizegiving.

An upbringing on a 18,900 acre sheep and cattle farm in the North Island of New Zealand, life was tough and exciting for Steve and his seven siblings during the 1960s. Wildlife was plentiful, wild Kaimanawa Brumbies were captured and broken in for stock horses. Hunting and fishing put food on the table and adrenaline in the veins. Hard work and independence was expected.



At age 17, Steve climbed into a helicopter for the

first time and from that moment he knew he was destined to fly— he was hooked. Three years later, he began a career as a shooter for his oldest brother Joe Collins on venison recovery operations based in Opotiki. He survived a helicopter crash with his two brothers in 1981 and continued shooting until 1983.



In 2003 Steve was offered the position as chief pilot and operations manager for Project Isabella in the Galapagos Islands. The project was contracted by the United Nations Development Program and Charles Darwin Foundation to eradicate feral goats and donkeys to restore habitat to save many unique endemic species from extinction

This was the largest and most successful ungulate eradication program ever achieved. It was during this project, Steve realized he'd become an eco warrior.

Steve has also become a very accomplished photographer so Im sure we will see some of this on the night as he shares some of the 'life of Steve'.

Most definitely a night not to be missed.

# Consultation on the protection of native taonga species in Southern Coromandel

The Department of Conservation's Hauraki Office plans to reduce rat, possum and stoat numbers to protect Coromandel brown kiwi, Archey's frog, long-tailed bat, kārearea (New Zealand falcon) from local extinction in Thames Coast, Kauaeranga Valley, Kapowai and Broken Hills.

The Southern Coromandel contains extensive forest areas, including rare coastal forests. These areas are valued for their diverse native flora and fauna, scenic natural landscapes and range of recreation and tourism opportunities.

Southern Coromandel's indigenous forests include mixed podocarp and broadleaf forest, remnant kauri, coastal pohutakawa and kanuka shrubland.

The forest ecosystems across Coromandel support a great diversity of flora and fauna, including many endemic and vulnerable species. The forests are home to invertebrates, bats, birds and lizards, and provide important habitat for native frogs. The threatened Coromandel brown kiwi is found across many forest and shrubland areas on the Peninsula.

DOC's Tiakina Nga Manu operations target stoats. rats and possums - major threats to our endemic and taonga species, including the long-tailed bats and Coromandel brown kiwi.

#### Why we are controlling possums and/or rodents

Possums and rodents threaten native species. To protect these species, DOC is planning to carry out an aerial operation to control these predators across

24,100ha of public conservation land in the Southern Coromandel, as shown on the map. Helicopters with calibrated buckets will distribute cereal bait containing 1080 bait along pre-determined and monitored flight paths. This operation will give threatened taonga species a chance to recover and allow the Coromandel brown kiwi population an opportunity to breed and have chicks that reach maturity.



#### Consultation - Have your say

DOC is consulting on the effects of predator control. Your views are important, and you are encouraged to provide comment. We are here to listen to you.



Epro Ltd (our contractor) or DOC staff from the Hauraki office would like to visit you at a convenient time to discuss the proposed operation; how it affects you, and what we can do to mitigate these effects.

DOC will be undertaking early engagement with our Treaty partners to ensure the best approach for the protecting of taonga species is achieved on the ground.

# Use of a range of predator control methods to protect species

Aerial application of cereal pellets containing 1080 is the most effective control method over large areas. It is the only viable method in remote, rugged terrain. Ground-based trapping and bait stations are effective in smaller more accessible areas, however the number of possum/rodents and stoats can overwhelm trapping networks. In those areas aerial 1080 may be used to supplement the existing ground-based work. Aerial 1080 operations target rodents. Stoats are also reduced effectively as they eat rodents/possums.

#### **Timeframe**

Operations will start when monitoring shows predators have reached levels threatening bird populations. At this stage, this operation will occur between 1st August and 30th November. The operation is weather dependent. You will be notified of the more specific time before the operation.

#### **Planning**

DOC engages and works closely with iwi, its local Treaty Partner for all predator control. DOC consults with stakeholders, affected landowners and communities.

Following feedback from this consultation process, decisions will be made on what changes can be made to the operational plan to mitigate the effects of the operation on you.

A notification fact sheet will be distributed closer to the time to confirm any changes to the boundary plan and the timeframe.

Also, DOC and Epro will contact all neighbours, advertise in the local newspaper and place warning signs at entrances to public conservation land immediately prior to the operation starting.

DOC will also contact iwi, landowners and stakeholders after the operation to inform them the operation has been completed successfully, including details of reduction of predator levels.

Use of 1080 requires permission from the local Public Health Protection office of the Ministry of Health.

DOC assesses vertebrate predator control operations using a toxin on behalf of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). DOC staff follow procedures approved by the EPA. These regulations ensure the toxin is applied in a way that safeguards the public and the environment.



#### Key facts: What you need to know.

1080 is a manufactured, biodegradable toxin. Its active ingredient, fluoroacetate, is salt that occurs naturally in poisonous plants in Australia, Africa and Brazil. It does not accumulate. It is broken down naturally by microorganisms, fungi and plants into harmless compounds and does not leave permanent residues in soil, water, plants or animals.

DOC complies with all relevant regulations and takes a precautionary approach to the aerial application of biodegradable 1080.

All operations begin with an aerial pre-feed of non-toxic bait to prime possums/rodents to eat the toxic bait applied afterwards.

- The toxic cereal bait pellets contain 0.15% of 1080. They are about 2cm in diameter, cylindrical and dyed green.
- Non-toxic pre-feed cereal pellets are about 2cm in diameter, cylindrical and sandy coloured (not dyed).

#### Managing risk

1080 is poisonous to humans, domestic and game animals. Dogs are highly susceptible. In areas where the toxin has been applied, the risk to dogs will remain until poisoned carcasses have disintegrated - which can be anywhere between four and eight months.

These risks can be eliminated by following these rules:

**DO NOT** touch bait.

WATCH children at all times.

DO NOT EAT animals from this area.

Toxic baits and carcasses are **DEADLY to DOGS**.

Observe these rules whenever you see warning signs about pesticides. These warning signs indicate pesticide residues may be still present in baits and

animals. When signs are removed this means you can resume normal activities in the area.



# Stoats, Rats and all things trapping.....

As most of you will be aware from the info in previous newsletters, talking to club members and the likes, TVDA helps to run and monitor two very successful pest control trap lines in the district.

In summary - The Terry Line was first established 8 years ago up in the Kauaeranga Valley to help protect the extremely rare Pterostylis orchid that was found in the area. The rat populations were decimating the already precarious hold on life that this tiny gem had so we helped get the trap lines set out and from there Mike and Peter took over the work of keeping these traps checked on a monthly basis. Massive kudos to both of you for your dedication and hard work – it really has been so appreciated.

## WANTED – people to help out with the

- Terry Line (rat traps located on the Hydro Camp/Pinnacles track area (you do not go up to the Pinnacles but instead start off on the Pinnacles trap and loop back around to the carpark).
- There is also a new trap line going in along the valley floor from the Camping Ground at Kauaeranga and this is one that will appeal to those who feel that the Terry Line may be a bit beyond their 'days in the hills'. This is one that will be 'drivable' for the most part and easily accomplished for a much wider group of members.

# Both of these lines are programmed for checking once a month.

#### **AND**

DoC is also looking at a training day for new and old trappers with the app "walk the line" for recording catches and a bit of health and safety training. These Apps are very user friendly and a great way of keeping very accurate records of 'hot spots' that can further assist with other trapping programmes and help learn more about predatory patterns.

On the day of the App training they will also be replacing the old traps on the Terry line heading up to Pinnacles for those who are able to help out. If you are keen to learn about the new equipment but not up to walking the Terry Line – no problems at all, there is something for everyone and finding out more about the Valley Floor Line will be great as well.

This training day is currently marked on the calendar for the second week in August and will be at the Kauaeranga Visitor centre.

# Work on Motutapere Hut

Plans are now advancing for this year on getting materials flown up to the Hut for the repairs and maintenance so your help is needed please.

Once we get a group of members together who are able to help with this, the chopper can be organised, loaded up and the materials flown to the site.

Last year when this was all planned it got 'skuttled' as we were told at the 11<sup>th</sup> hour that the

chopper could not land on the helipad, that trees posed a safety issue at the site and.....etc!!!

The long and short of it all is that I have been in touch with DOC directly, Warren has since flown into the site with the operators that they use and it was absolutely fine. Permission has been fully granted for us to have materials flown into the site – we just need people to help with the work and matching window in the weather and the job is all go.

The work that is required relates to: levelling up the decking, fixing up the sink/bench so that the water actually runs out...., replacing slats on the bunks, recladding the mattress box to keep the vermin out, putting a storage area in the porch and just some other general tidy up work.

The materials are all sorted, there will be tools going in and staying in there for future use (to be kept in the storage area that will be locked) – we have just had to overcome some unfounded hurdles to get the gear into the hut.

For those going in, it will be possible for your packs etc to be flown in as well and we have permission to access the Rayonier Forestry area for a much quicker walk up the old cullers track to the hut. This will certainly make the trip up the hill on foot much quicker.

Taking your rifle or your bow is a must as well – this is not all work and no play. Hunting is also a key part of this trip so make sure you come equipped and either check out your favourite hunting spot or for up there for the first time, learn more about the area and some good places to hunt.

# BRANCH PROFILE: Thames Valley

THE TIME WAS RIGHT AND ACTION WAS NEEDED.
THE YEAR WAS 1956 AND A GROUP OF DEDICATED LOCAL
HUNTERS AND (AT THE TIME) MEMBERS OF WAIKATO BRANCH
WHO LIVED IN GREATER HAURAKI AND THAMES VALLEY AREA
GOT A SPEEDING TICKET ON THEIR WAY HOME ONE VERY
COLD AND WET WINTERS NIGHT FROM A WAIKATO BRANCH
CLUB MEETING SO THE DECISION WAS MADE.



e needed our own branch here in the Valley' and so it was that soon after a

local meeting was called, the Thames Valley Branch of NZDA was duly born from that and a new base for local hunters and shooters had arrived.

With huge passion for their sports, a wealth of experience coupled within their midst and an endless will to succeed, the members and committee of the day set the wheels in motion for what we have today. In the early years meetings and club nights were held at various local

pubs or people homes; halls in the various communities were used for the branches annual ball which we often hear were 'the events to go to' not only for members but for the wider community as well. Thames Valley Deerstalkers (TVDA) has always been an all-encompassing club and had made sure that there is always something for everyone – be that hunting on all fronts, rifle ranges, clay target shooting, archery, camaraderie, training, support and social events.

Time has been very kind to TVDA – thanks to the vision, immeasurable amounts of hard work, endless hours of volunteer input and smart decision making backed up by a fantastic community since those early days; this branch is one that really sits at the centre of the wider community on so many fronts.

Complete family involvement is a very humble but proud imprint that is at the base of TVDA and this is always seen when going back over the old club photos, reading the names on the trophies and hearing the stories that have been passed down through the generations of members since those formative years.

#### SO WHAT ABOUT TVDA, WHERE IS IT LOCATED AND WHAT'S ON OFFER

Where: TVDAs clubrooms, ranges and property are located on Morrison Road, Paeroa. While this is a tad outside the core of the Thames Valley region it is very much a part of wider region that proudly associates as 'the Valley' and is most welcoming of those from so much further afield as well. This has always been the case and with what we have to offer on so many fronts, the more people and families that can enjoy this, the better.

What's on offer: Owning our own property is a wonderful bonus that, when shared with others makes it even better still. The property includes our much admired clubrooms, rifle ranges (50m, 100m and running boar facilities), a full internationally ranked sporting clay target layout, field archery complex and a huge commitment to supporting members and the community right across the board.

Property: After having various temporary range locations in the formative years of the branch – some getting taken out with floods, another affected by power pylons being planned to go through the middle of it, it was time to find a permanent home. Such was the community spirit, that in 1977 the generosity of a local farmer (and non-member) offered a portion of his land for a permanent range and somewhere to build a clubrooms – and all on a handshake; nothing more was needed or expected by him.

Rifle ranges were built and used that year, the club had a home albeit a canvas tent for events but the spirit was unbreakable – we had a home. By early 1980's the initial clubrooms were built and before the decade was done, extensions had doubled the size of the building to accommodate the growing membership.

By now also club shotgun shoot's were popular on 'our land' and an opportunity to hold bigger events was on the radar. This saw large numbers of sporting clay target shooters arriving in droves, events had a top notch reputation and so the club expanded even more.

As is always the case – properties change hands; the year was 2000 and we had the chance to purchase the land where our clubrooms, ranges and activities were based. Fundraising efforts were kicked into gear; the support was fantastic from members, locals and the community – and just a couple of months later, we had the funds secured for the 7 hectares that we had surveyed off. What a great feeling - we now owned this piece

of paradise and within 10 years and huge accolades to all those that contributed to the massive amounts of hard work and toil, all loans and debentures were fully repaid.

The people: TVDA has a membership that last year tipped the scales at just over the 400 mark and while a number of these were family members, everyone is a fully valued and respected member of the branch. In addition to the aims and goals of those wonderful founders of the branch who have gone before us,

the heart of TVDA is still set around the entire family and encouraging people of all ages and backgrounds to get out and enjoy the best that the outdoors has to offer. Whether you hunt deer or pigs, chamois or tahr, you are part of us, it doesn't matter if you shoot with a shotgun, a rimfire or a large calibre rifle - the ranges are open; be it a compound bow or a recurve - the targets are there to be hit. Mums and Dads, kids and grandparents alike - they are all involved as are the neighbours too and plenty more that come along. We also have an amazingly supportive wider community and this can never be overlooked hunting, fishing, shooting and the great outdoors are so important and well understood by this community and the benefits of that are so truly humbling.

Shooting Activities: in addition to our ranges being available for members to use outside of scheduled activities, club events include rimfire and centrefire shooting events/competitions, we hold three running boar shoots a year (as a minimum), the field archery/bowhunters have a monthly club day, we hold two major sporting clay target competitions each year (November and February) and the summer months see twilight clay target shooting each week. All of our facilities are wheelchair accessible and fully catered for. The TVDA grounds are also 'home' to the local Ohinemuri Fish and Game Assn for their events and this is a way for us to further contribute to the kinship and sporting diversity that abounds in our area.

Hunting: Given that there are no recognised wild deer populations across the greater Thames Valley or Coromandel Peninsula region, travel to pursue our hunting has always been a given. Early years saw a fallow herd at Matatoki although that got wiped out many years ago primarily due to farming intensification, however pigs are still aplenty in those rugged hills and they're a magnet for hunters. The nearby Kaimai-Mamaku range to the south of our area holds good numbers of red deer and supporting the management of them is key to us having them on our 'southern doorstep'. The Ohinemuri River is a natural geographical boundary for the deer and the Coromandel Range is designated as deer free so we all need to work towards keeping it that way.

Club trips have always been a really important part of TVDA Culture – back in those very early years, the lure of Fiordland and Stewart Island saw annual club trips taken to those distant parts of our beautiful country. No same day delivery back then – these were marathon journeys just to get there by road and sea and a month off work or off the farm was the norm. Families back home kept the wheels turning to support their avid hunters and this in turn, is what kept the heart of TVDA pumping.

Club trips are still a regular part of the club's annual calendar – some of these trips still visit those distant hunting grounds, there are weekend trips to the Kaimanawa's and Te Urewera that get a visit or two each year as do private properties for planned hunts and there are social events and fishing trips too – and everyone is welcome. A strong focus for all of our club hunts is to take new

people along and help them get started in their sport, mentor them and introduce them to new areas to hunt.

Training: TVDA was part of the core group of branches that got HUNTS kick-started within NZDA and we are extremely proud of that. For so many people in our area they are not brought up with the mountains and the ranges but the desire to be out there needs to be supported. Our branch runs a HUNTS course most years and the results of those are great to see. When we look at HUNTS being approximately 30 years old as a NZDA branch, we look further back than that and treasure the work that Life Member Mike Deane instigated at least 45 years ago - a Junior's Survival Weekend. Essentially this covered many aspects of the modern day HUNTS course plus a few extras and these weekends away were extremely popular. Things have changed over the years but the core values are the same - it's about getting youngsters out there and learning about and enjoying the great outdoors. These Kids Survival Camps are now booked on a first in first served basis - they are that popular; Mike is still fully involved and the results are fantastic. When you see past attendees bringing their own children along because it was 'the best time ever', you know you are on the right track.

Outside Events: In the early 1990's sporting clay target shooting was in full swing by many of our members so it seemed a natural progression to add this to our club's connections and activities. Events sprung up, throngs of shooters started arriving and so began our affiliation to the NZ Clay Target Association. Over the years we have hosted a wide range of sporting clay events and they have been a fantastic opportunity for our club via club events, twilight shoots, Regional Competitions, NZ National and Oceania Sporting Clay Championships and the pinnacle of it all, was holding the World English Sporting Champs in 2011.

A couple of decades later, bow hunting in the area was having a resurgence and the branch was approached to see if these archers and hunters could be 'part of our club'. It was a no brainer to have them involved and it's great having further diversity within our ranks. Over the last ten years the club has hosted two National Bowhunter Championships, multiple Kiwi 3D target competitions, interclub events and we were also part of a wider venue for an Oceania Archery Championships.

Something for everyone: In addition to the classic hunting and shooting activities, our venue also hosts several school events each year – normally with a focus on firearms safety, outdoor safety and time on the range. There are other functions at our venue as well – the venue, location and stunning backdrop are popular attractions for a wedding venue too.

Always looking for new ideas: About 15 years ago a club hunt had a member's friend who was a quadriplegic join us which was awesome - and the light went on. We needed to make more opportunities like this available for people with varying levels of mobility. As we headed home that day with a deer slung on the back of his Argo, the brain was working overtime and so it has been that since then, several people in wheelchairs or with limited mobility, have been introduced to range shooting, taken into the hills and wow - what a buzz that is. Helping these people to get an animal and seeing the massive thrill for them and everyone else involved is what makes it all so worthwhile. There is 'no such thing as can't', it's just 'how do we make this happen'.

Firearms Support: TVDA was the venue for one of the very first COLFO meetings in the 1990's and the clubrooms were packed to standing room only. As a branch we have never shied away from taking a lead or responsibility for our sport and what is so important to it. This has been further endersed by our venue being a firearms licensing centre for many years and the club has a strong compliment of fully qualified range officers.

Women: For all but a small handful of years in the branches history; women have been part of the committee and junior members too have been a welcome part of the branch's nucleus. There is never an 'us and them' mentality around the committee table – everyone has a hugely valued contribution that the hunting and outdoor sports can benefit from. Men in the kitchen, women as range officers and kids helping out at shooting events or setting up camps – it's all in a day's work.

Kids: We have over 60 years of valuable history that have shown that involving children and juniors from a young age into all aspects of the club's activities has been priceless. They know the ethics behind harvesting game, they are fully familiar with the drill on the range, they are brought up with good firearms safety processes and they take full ownership for their actions. They are valued, respected and supported – the key ingredients for happy and successful kids.

DoC Projects: Soon after securing the ownership of our property, it came to our notice that the extremely valued 'cullers huts' in the Kaimai's were to be removed as they were 'too dangerous and didn't meet the new criteria'. Knowing how essential shelter can be in the outdoors and particularly when it cuts up rough, we went into bat to have these retained.

After a lengthy process we were offered a
MOU, the huts were retained, the needs
of the outdoors community benefitted
immensely and more was to come.

Since then we have been approached to help install and monitor trap lines in the Kauaeranga Valley to protect an extremely rare orchid that had been found but was getting decimated by rats. Great stuff - the guys and girls were lined up to pack trap boxes into the hills, the two lines were set up and have been an on-going project for close on 10 years now. The results have been great, the dedication has been unwavering and from this we have also now added another project - the K2K stoat line which follows the length of the Kopu to Kaiaua leg of the Hauraki Rail Trail and protects the world renown RAMSAR site in that area.

Where to now: TVDA is always looking to make new and positive opportunities available to people, maximising the full range of our facilities and taking on new adventures and challenges along the way.

This is what kicked started TVDA all those years ago by that car load of guys who got that speeding ticket and so we as future members have taken up the mantle of continuing their ensuing vision and hard work by supporting the future generations of good keen people who love the outdoors as much as they did.

Their legacy is just as strong as it ever was and we are proud to have and share our branch here in the Valley. NZHW

# Info from NZCTA re New Gun Laws

Below is information that has been supplied to us via the New Zealand Clay Target Assn. It has been sent to all National Shooting bodies and asked that it be sent out to their members. More info on this will be in the next newsletter and also on the club website page.

#### Changes to the Arms Act which may affect you

New changes to the Arms Act have started to come into effect. Because our records show you are or have been a firearms licence holder, Police is reaching out to you to share information on the changes and how they may impact you.

The changes will impact on firearms licence holders to a lesser or greater extent depending on your individual activities. The changes give greater transparency to what will be considered when a person applies for a licence.

The changes are coming into effect in stages, with the immediate changes summarised below. More information on these and later changes can be found on the <a href="Police website">Police website</a>. The website is the main source of information for people. It also holds frequently asked questions and will be regularly updated. We encourage you to visit the website to look at the changes in more detail.

#### Summary of the immediate changes

- People seeking a firearms licence for the first time will be eligible for a five year licence
  only. Others who may have let their licence expire or surrendered their licence or had it
  revoked are also eligible for a five year licence. At the end of the five year licence and if
  they have retained their fit and proper status they then will be eligible to apply for a ten
  year licence.
- A small group of <u>additional firearms are now prohibited</u>, including those short (pistollength) semi-automatic rifles that had been defined as pistols because of their shorter lengths, and centrefire pump-action rifles with a detachable magazine or a non-detachable magazine capable of holding more than 10 cartridges. There are also new requirements for <u>lawful possession of a pistol carbine conversion kit</u> (which converts a pistol into a shoulder-fired firearm).

An amnesty is in place against criminal prosecution for possession of the above noted items. Regulations will be developed to enable a new buy-back and this will be well publicised when dates are confirmed. We ask that if you have one of the prohibited items or a pistol carbine conversion kit, that you please safely and securely store these items.

You can visit the website to find out if you are eligible to apply for an <a href="endorsement">endorsement</a> and <a href="permit to possess">permit to possess</a> to retain and use these items.

- Endorsements for wild animal and animal pest controllers will have a maximum duration of 2 years and 6 months.
- Additional exemptions have been created for those who own or manage an agricultural business and there is a real possibility the commercial viability of the business would be detrimentally affected by wild animals or animal pests and they can only be controlled through the use of prohibited firearms.
- Visitors to New Zealand will no longer be able to buy and take ownership of a firearm for use during their visit (they can buy and export only). However, visitors can import their own firearm, and lease, hire or borrow another firearm.

- New and updated offences and penalties.
- A Minister of Police's advisory group comprised of both firearm-owning and non-firearmowning people must now be established to provide ongoing advice to the Minister.
- The Arms Act is set to be reviewed again in 2025.

#### Note on future changes

More changes will be coming into force from December 2020, from June 2021, from June 2022, and from June 2023. More detailed information on those changes will be put on the Police website in due course.

What we do know is that the laws relating to clubs and ranges will come into effect in 2022.

We can advise though that much of what is anticipated in the new laws we already do on a regular basis and our TVDA Range is fully certified so we are well on the day to being fully compliant and meeting the requirements even at this stage.

# DoC Minister and Managers give hunters the finger

They had the opportunity to prioritise culling tahr in the exclusion zones whilst consulting properly. They had the opportunity to meet biodiversity requirements without sacrificing a hunting resource that employs hundreds of New Zealanders.

Instead in a triumph of arrogance and dogma over reason, Minister Sage and her Department (lead by Ben Reddiex in this endeavour) **yesterday starting shooting bull tahr in the National Parks**. The court didn't say they couldn't so instead of showing any goodwill to the consultation wishes of the judge they have effectively said f\*\*\* you to hunters.

This is the kind of behaviour we can look forward to unless we are effective in forcing the department and the politicians that fund it to behave more reasonably. Make no mistake this is not the end of the extremism, **the Ruahines deer are reportedly next.** 

Already across the country hunter groups running conservation projects are giving DoC notice that their projects may be threatened through lack of volunteers and enthusiasm for a department hell bent on unnecessary heavy handed control to levels where hunting is unviable. All this driven by a mix of dogma and new funding rather than actual biodiversity need. All this harm purely for dogma.

They will not change tack unless we make them through sheer weight of numbers and the churn we can create. YOU need to write (politely) to both DoC and Government ministers such as the deputy Prime Minister, Grant Robertson who is Minister of Sport and Recreation (g.robertson@ministers.govt.nz). Hunting as a sport has more male participants than rugby or cricket (154,000 from the 2014 sport and active recreation survey), we need to remind them of how many of us there actually are, and we will all vote in September.

Write to NZ First, it was they who gave us Minister Sage and her extremism after all. All the Minister contacts and guidance can be found via the following link.

#### Remember to also ask questions and note them as official information requests.

- Ask the deputy Prime Minister if it is government policy to put New Zealanders out of work so as one Minister can pursue a long held goal of eradicating a species she does not value. Note your concerns over this excessive cull and what might be next.
- Ask other government ministers including your local MP questions in relation to game animals etc etc

The following questions of DoC and the Conservation Minister might be useful to you though please mix and match rather than simply copy. The main thing is we need lots and lots of feedback and questions to get their attention.

- Communication including email between the Minister of Conservation and Forest and Bird and also from the Minister to the Conservation Authority for period 1/1/2020 until 17/7/2020 with regards to Tahr/Tahr control and/or deer control
- Communication between or including James Holborow and Ben Reddiex and Forest and Bird for period 1/1/2020 until 17/7/2020 with regards to Tahr/Tahr control and/or deer control.
- Date and location and data of any tahr control operations that have happened during the year 2020 to date(17/7/2020)
- Date/location and information regarding any Tahr monitoring that has happened during the year 2020 to date29/6/2020)
- Communication between Ngai Tahu and the Department of Conservation in the period 1/1/2020 until 17/7/2020 with regards to Tahr/Tahr control.
- Tier one vegetation monitoring data for the years 2018/19, including Tahr metadata record sheets, subplot measurements-snow tussock, acipylla and fleshy herb record sheets, random subplot record sheets, individual measurements-snow tussocks sheet, individual measurement -acipylla and fleshy herb sheets and individual measurements-woody shrub sheets.
- Tier one vegetation monitoring data for the years 2017/18, including Tahr metadata record sheets, subplot measurements-snow tussock, acipylla and fleshy herb record sheets, random subplot record sheets, individual measurements-snow tussocks sheet, individual measurement -acipylla and fleshy herb sheets and individual measurements-woody shrub sheets.
- Ask for the DoC communication plan and who fact checked materials to be used in it and who was provided with those materials and when.
- When will the Himalayan Tahr Control Plan be formally reviewed as was required over 20 years ago?
- When will the HimalayanTahr Control Plan be given science based data to replace the now nearly 30 year old conservative estimates used in the absence of information on tahr numbers and vegetation health?

Go for it and do it soon!

#### DOC RESTARTS TAHR CULL BEFORE CONSULTATION

Friday, 17 July 2020, 4:38 pm Press Release: <u>Tahr Foundation</u>

DOC have begun killing tahr in Aoraki/Mt Cook and Westland Tai Poutini National Parks before undertaking consultation with the hunting sector and it is another kick in the guts says the NZ Tahr Foundation.

The killing of bull tahr in Aoraki/Mt Cook and Westland Tai Poutini National Parks has always been the most controversial part of the culling programme.



"Mature bull tahr in our national parks are the ultimate recreational and commercial resource and worth up to \$14,000 each to the economy so we are quite frustrated that DOC have chosen to do this part of the operation before consultation has begun," says the Tahr Foundation's Willie Duley.

"While we acknowledge that last week's High Court decision gave DOC the right to begin culling before consultation, we hoped they would have given the hunting sector the chance to have a say before starting with the national parks."

"Tahr hunters regard Aoraki/Mt Cook and Westland Tai Poutini National Parks as the pinnacle of the Kiwi alpine hunting experience. To have this taken away without even being consulted is a very bitter pill to swallow."

"Contrary to what DOC claims, there is no conservation imperative for this, especially to target bulls as the bulls don't have kids. This will have a far bigger impact on peoples' livelihoods than what DOC are suggesting. They have not even considered the effects on the huge recreational hunting sector and the retail industries that rely on it"

"It would have been an act of good faith for DOC to have prioritised the control work outside the feral range that all stakeholders agree needs to happen. That is uncontroversial and vital to preventing tahr spreading to surrounding landscapes," says Duley.

"We are also worried that many recreational tahr hunters and other backcountry users currently in the mountains are unaware DOC have restarted their helicopter culling operations. We have had contact with local operators that have hunters potentially in close proximity to tahr in and around the national parks, that are concerned at the safety risk this presents."

DOC's restarting of culling operations brings into stark focus just how important it is that the long-out-of-date 1993 Himalayan Tahr Control Plan is reviewed and an acceptable long-term management strategy put in place.

"I'm sure I can speak for all stakeholders when I say we are sick of the almost annual conflict that the 1993 Plan and DOC's failure to review it has created," says Duley.

"The 1993 Plan was put in place as a best-guess at a time when little information was really known about tahr in our alpine environment. The intention stated within the Plan was for it to be reviewed and updated as more science and information was developed."



"DOC have never undertaken the proper research on vegetation impacts, herd densities and the contributions of recreational and commercial hunting that are necessary to inform future management. Instead they focus on short-term culling programmes like what is happening right now that pit the various stakeholders against each other."

"The reality is that there is a huge amount of common ground among stakeholders. We all agree that tahr must be eradicated outside their

feral range, we all accept that some form of management is required and yet we also know that tahr are an extremely precious recreational and commercial resource," says Duley.

"Those are solid foundations to build an enduring management regime upon."

Over 50,000 people have signed the Tahr Foundation's petition calling for a halt to the cull and hundreds are expected at the hunter-led Tahr Jam protest drive from Lake Pukaki to Aoraki/Mt Cook on Sunday.

More than a year later, look what COLFO has achieved: a strong united voice for law-abiding, decent New Zealanders, who happen to enjoy firearm based sports, recreation, and lifestyles. Far from the "Trolls" the Police Association and Police Minister called us, COLFO has actually been the voice of rational debate.

But with the assent to the Arms Legislation Act – despite its very clear flaws, despite the exposure of the Police cover-up of their irresponsibility, and despite all the promises from NZ First that they stood with rural New Zealand – it shows that a strong voice outside of Parliament just isn't enough.

And as we saw with the decision from the High Court on Thursday, it doesn't matter that you have traditional human rights and longstanding law on your side. A majority coalition in Parliament can ride roughshod over you and your rights.
