# TVDA Annual General Meeting – May 2021 Presidents Report

Things have been juggled around a fair bit since this time last year but it would be fair to say that in the main, TVDA has not been affected in any real way by Covid and the impacts it has had on other sectors. For that we have to be very thankful and grateful, as we are for all those others in our communities as well. Covid has certainly been a wakeup call, it's delivered some pretty challenging and frustrating times but many of us have learnt a lot along the way.

The first real change on the wider NZDA scene was at the 2020 Conference where there was almost a completely new Executive voted in (except for one) that took over the reins of our National Association and had to not only pick up the pieces, but get us back on the right path. The current Executive, under the guidance of President Craig Benbow and new CEO Gwyn Thurlow have done an excellent job and special thanks must go to them all for their absolute dedication, commitment and vision for the betterment of all branches and members. NZDA would simply not be where it is today and nor would the branches had it not been for their hard work – our utmost thanks goes to you all.

Since the last AGM we have seen DOC's dogged attitude in some areas — ie towards the Tahr cull in the South Island and this could only be matched by the approach that the Government has taken on their rulings regarding new firearms legislation. With the recent consultation that we engaged in through the Police, it would seem this was clearly targeted to get the answers that the Government wanted rather than getting genuine feedback that could provide accuracy and fact. I commend all of you that took the time to make submissions to the Police as without this valued input from you, we would literally be staring down the wrong barrel. It goes without saying that lawful and legal firearms owners of this country MUST continue to speak up in support of what is right and proper regarding our sport, recreations and the future that our children and grandchildren should be able to enjoy. Please do not sit on your hands, do not hide behind someone else — when the next lot of submissions are due for Phase 2, please ensure you all do submissions, get your neighbours and non-members alike to submit as well. Our voices; your voices need to be heard.

Covid did throw cold water on some events of ours towards the latter part of 2020 in the form of particularly our TVDA Anniversary Cup shoot in November and a couple of other smaller events but most things were able to be rescheduled. The TVDA Cup was cancelled but we certainly made up for it numbers wise in February when the Maureen Bennett Shoot arrived with 172 shooters attending on the day. An outstanding effort all round by the club's many helpers and neighbours who ensured that this ran so smoothly and also to the wonderful support that we get from our loyal shotgun shooting fraternity.

HUNTS was a wonderful success in 2020 and part of this success I believe was brought about by some of the changes that we made due to Covid. A pre-HUNTS get together and then a few other variations along the way, coupled with an awesome bunch of 14 trainees

really did highlight the immense value that these courses provide. On the flip side though, there is no way that these annual courses could be held or run without the sterling efforts of our fantastic group of volunteers, mentors and supporters. Thank you all so much for your incredible help and support and I know I speak from the branch, the committee and the trainees as well.

Archery, range shooting events, range use in general and kids events have been ongoing throughout the year once the Covid levels allowed and this has also seen a number of new members joining up and becoming involved in our branch. Like all other aspects of branch life – it takes people and volunteers to help keep these events and facilities up to spec and running in good order so my most grateful thanks to all those who have assisted in any way with this – your input really has been such an asset. This must also be said for the considerable time and effort spent working on particularly the Motutapere Hut in the Kaimais this year. It really is a fabulous wee hut to now visit and everyone's contributions have made this possible – take a bow everyone who has been involved.

Other changes that we have been involved in on a wider scale have been the NZDA Regional Meetings with us hosting the first one (under the new executive) in October last year and more recently, being involved in the set up and running of two NZDA Ladies Hunting weekends. Both of these avenues have been an outstanding success and much of this has been due to new ideas, new members being involved and positive attitudes all round. There more of these be many opportunities and others that are still waiting in the wings to get kick

started so now is a great time to be involved and help make some very real and positive changes within NZDA. Further to the two topics Ive just mentioned, you will also be aware that through particularly the work for TVDA and Waikato initially and now also with Te Awamutu on board, we have worked with Waikato Regional Council to initiate a trial of the Farmer Assist Programme for removing deer on some private farmland in the WRC Catchment. This has also been enabled through the very positive work and input from Managers and staff at WRC so our huge thanks must also rest with them as well. It really highlights that the work and approach that TVDA has taken as a branch for many years is now filtering further afield. These opportunities have also highlighted to me that as a branch we are, and have been very much leaders in our field for many years and I am extremely proud of that but also all of you that have helped make this happen.

On the topic of leaders and those that make things happen, I am going to ask through this forum that we all seriously consider expanding the number of members that we have on

our committee. We do not have a maximum limit but when I compare the number of active members on our committee versus that of many other branches, I see a real need for more people to help spread the load. The other branches that I have compared us to have in the vicinity of 15 – 20 committee members but they often don't have any ranges, some don't run HUNTs courses, they only do NZDA events whereas we also do shotgun shooting and archery, they have no Junior events, many don't own their own building let alone property and some hold very few if any club hunts etc. I am not saying that everyone on the committee has to take on a massive role but as a current group we cannot keep carrying the bulk of this load on our own and still keep progressing TVDA for you the members. Please consider putting your hand up to be on the committee or to help out with a role that interests you, maybe help with being on a group that looks after a specific area – ie ranges etc as this will all help in a major way. Junior members are also most welcome to be part of the TVDA Committee – just the same as we make sure there are plenty of events for junior members and so the wheel keeps turning. Some jobs can be done on an adhoc basis when you have some spare time perhaps – there will be something for anyone who is able and keen to help out. The newsletter is something that I have to apologise for not having done more regularly this year – it is a key communication tool with our members and I feel that I have let you all down in this regard but I just simply do not have the capacity to do everything that is currently on my TVDA plate. If there is someone who is keen or able to take on the role of newsletter editor and/or be a com's person that would be amazing and such a help to the wider membership all round. Thank you all so much for your patience and understanding regarding the lack of newsletters this year.

Docking down at Panekiri this year was another very real success and with two crews working in tandem around various parts of the station we knocked out the entire job (except for the lates that were to be done in a couple of weeks) in 8 full days of docking. This is an excellent effort all round and a very valued fund raiser for the branch and when coupled with the Police use on the range these two income streams are a real asset to us. The help, support, understanding and contributions of all members is what enables this to happen so thank you very much.

A special mention must also be made to our many and varied sponsors and supporters who assist TVDA in all manner of ways throughout the year. Your contributions are always so incredibly valued and it was great that we were able to bring together our Sponsor and Supporters Function earlier this year to say a very special 'thankyou' to these people in person. While not everyone was able to make the evening, it was absolutely our pleasure and privilege to be able to 'give back' and include everyone in the invites.

That rounds out my take on the year but it certainly could not have happened without the wonderful help and support of those on the committee, members of the branch and family members at home who have assisted in so many ways. Your valued inputs and contributions have really formed a very strong and connected 'TVDA Community' and this is something that I see growing considerably as we work through the year ahead.

- find a new place to hunt and get the benefit of knowledge and information from those that have been there before




• just come away and enjoy a weekend with friends and other members even if you are not able to get out in the hills for some reason – it's a great social atmosphere and everyone is most welcome.

catch up. The views were stunning, the ideas that were shared were invaluable and the future of HUNTS is very positive. Massive thanks to Shaun Maloney and Pete Henderson for bringing this opportunity together and sharing such an amazing place with us all.

Friday night and the opening of conference was at the Franklin Hunting and Fishing shop and what an awesome night – an endless BBQ on tap with a delicious array to tempt the taste buds, excellent discounts on offer and a wonderful chance to meet and catch up with other delegates from around the country. Regular shuttles were on hand to ferry us all

back to the hotel or digs afterwards – filled to the brim and ready for conference to start tomorrow. Getting a tap on the shoulder and a 'local gidday' from past TVDA member Lance Bonkovich was great and really highlights that we only move to other areas – not move 'away'.

Conference started at 8.30am and with the formalities, roll call and apologies out of the way it was time to hear from President Craig Benbow, CEO Gwyn Thurlow and Treasurer Carolyn Heffernan through their various Annual Reports to conference. We have all seen the massive improvements on all fronts for us as members and the association over the last 12 months and having some more background behind these results was so beneficial to hear. Things are certainly on the right path, with a very strong focus on the future and always searching for more opportunity, promotions and benefits for us as hunters and shooters, the lands that we enjoy our recreations on and the ongoing improvements to our native species – especially those that are being brought back from the brink. It was also very humbling to take a special message from our branch committee to 'express our very grateful thanks on behalf of TVDA but also all branches and members of the Association to everyone involved with the current board, CEO and office staff for their outstanding efforts, dedication to details and scrutiny that has resulted in such a massive turn around in the Associations' affairs'. This was a

privilege for sure and the resounding applause from all at conference supported our comments. Many thanks to our committee for offering and supporting this gesture and the really positive platform that it helped to set.

Following these reports and question time, it was time for the Notices of Motion that ranged from the usual levies, through to a couple of rule changes and in the main, these were 'tidy ups' rather than breaking new ground. There was one NOM that we opposed and that was for the Chas Forsyth trophy (for trophies taken by those with a disability and those over 65) whereby some of the criteria offered enabled the animals to be taken following paying a trophy and guiding fee. While we are 100% in support of a trophy for these hunters with disabilities (however there is already a trophy category for hunters over 65), we feel that this is just a 'deep pockets trophy' and does not really support those with a disability. We also put it forward that as all of these members entered this category must be a member of NZDA branches, then it should be up to the branches to help people with additional needs to get a trophy rather than them having to focus on paying guides and trophy fees. Our point of view was lost at the vote but we gave it our best to point out the other view. We are also concerned that it will open the door for all trophies in the future to then be taken with the aid of having paid a trophy and guiding fee but that's for another day......time will tell!!

Given TVDA's huge support for the intent of the Chas Forsyth Trophy (for hunters with disabilities) we have agreed that we will be donating a National trophy for this but only where a trophy and guiding fee has NOT been paid to ensure a much fairer playing field and more accessiblity to all hunters. Our trophy will also allow a deviation from the other AHT Fair Chase rules that enables the hunter to have the use of a 'vehicle' as we know and fully appreciate that this is the only way for many that they can get to, move about and be accommodated in the outdoors. Keep this on your radar guys – and let's see some entries next year.

Due to the significant work undertaken by the NZDA board and Gwyn which also expanded to

those on the Tahr Foundation, their massive amount of work done is what has seen DOC coming to the table to discuss and work a way forward to prevent our Tahr from being 'run out of town' to put it politely...... Hats off and a special thank you to you all for your extensive knowledge, your outstanding dedication and commitment.

On the predator front it was a bonus 101 to have guru Andy Glasser from Whakatane at conference to give an overview on the countrywide role that he oversees – the trapping projects that are specifically targeted to protect out endangered Whio. I spoke to Andy after

his presentation and while a specific visit to our club is not really an option due to his hectic schedule (and the requests from branches for the same thing all around the country) but he was only too happy to do a presentation and hand on session with trapping and mustelid control at the next Regional Meeting which is to be held in Rotorua in August.

Other presentations from the HUNTS team, GAC and Act MP Nicole McKee (also past Colfo spokesperson), were really enlightening. Nicole's outstanding ability to speak and hold an audience was fantastic to hear and see in person. She spoke from the heart but with an abundance of professionalism and knowledge from within the House. She also expanded on the process for getting Bills into the 'biscuit tin' and how so much of it is about timing and watching what and who else has 'things in the wind'. Nicole got a standing ovation for her presentation which could only be matched by her dedication and

commitment to us all – from us here at TVDA Nicole; thankyou so much for all that you are doing on behalf of the lawful and legal firearms communities of NZ. Next to follow was an 'open the door' presentation by Sarah Cotching (Sec from BOP) and Courtney Pellow (Sec

from Auckland) on Women in Hunting which was great to see. These two wonderful ladies have spearheaded the Inaugural NZDA Women's Hunting trip to Clements Road in the summer and so much more is on the horizons for this. An example of this was the follow-up trip that TVDA hosted in May and these are just starting points. It has been very easy for us at TVDA to grab this and run with it because 'women in hunting' has always been fully supported here in our branch but this is definitely not


This is also as I see it, a key part of being a member of NZDA and being able to help promote and support this will be fantastic.






#### Murray Fisher's Obituary - By Keven and Christine Caddy



Now's the time when these pesky little killers are really foraging around for food and then it will be into the spring months when they really crank up to feed their young over the breeding season. The



Swamp Comp is an awesome way to reward people for setting traps, nabbing these mustelids and helping to increase all bird populations – particularly those of our native species and ground nesting birds – ie ducks and pheasants etc.

All you have to do is cut off the tail, put it in the freezer in a zip lock bag and then hand them into Hunting and Fishing in November.

Tails that are eligible for the competition are: Weasel, stoat and ferret tails.

Any other pests that you catch and remove from the ecosystem are a bonus....
