

Presidents Report.....from the AGM

Welcome along and thank you for attending our 62nd Annual General Meeting.

Back in 2005 when I agreed to take on this job because nobody else would, little did I think that I would still be doing this 14 years later.

These last 12 months have been a bit of a roller coaster for us all – not just as a committee but members alike as we have undertaken our numerous events and projects throughout the year, but we have had the notification of the neighbouring land being proposed for residential subdivision and then in more recent times, several of our sporting and recreational choices, and the very nature of them, have come under intense scrutiny following the March 15 atrocities in Christchurch. The real crunch factor for us as legal law abiding firearms owners is yet to come as many of our firearms have to be relinquished by September this year. They say that the bigger the challenges the stronger it makes you and I am sure that this will be the case as we all move forward into and through a successful year ahead for TVDA and our activities here on our grounds and further afield.

Special thanks this year must go to your committee for their hard work and commitment; and a reduced number on the committee it has been too, over the last 12 months. The lower than normal number of committee members has produced challenges of its own along the way, as spare time for us all is becoming a rarer commodity so I am very keen for this situation to be altered when we come to the elections a little bit later on. A workload shared and fresh ideas are the key components to ongoing success.

Work and upgrades at the club and property here have still continued in a very positive manner over the last year. There have been cameras installed, the 100m range area has been concreted which has made such a wonderful improvement, a wood/storage shed has been installed, some more trees have been removed to better accommodate our sporting clay needs and this is all in addition to the many regular events that take place up here. This all consumes a significant amount of time and input from the dedicated members that have ensured that everything runs so smoothly – your input and expertise is hugely appreciated.

We had our annual docking fundraiser at Panekiri in October despite the fact that Mark and Gaylene Boenders, our extremely loyal and fantastic supporters were not in the Manager's seat at the time. Huge thanks to the dedication and professionalism of the teams that worked through what could have been a very challenging situation this year but you all did the club proud and honoured the excellent support that we have had from Mark and Gaylene from the outset. Club trips have been sadly lacking over the last 12 months and this is because in the main, people ask for them to happen and then they don't support them. This is very frustrating and time consuming to say the least. Please give this some thought for the year ahead – we as a committee are really keen to help get people out there in the hills, we endeavour make club trips happen, if it's preferred we make sure that new members/hunters have experienced hunters with them, we share new areas to hunt and so the list of positives continue but we need to have the buyin of the members; after all, it is you as the members who ask for these events in the first place.

The other thing that I would really like to see happening is for members to encourage and take a new hunter out with them from time to time – I have been fortunate to spend many hours in the hills with new hunters this last year and it's been really awesome and so refreshing. I believe we all have a 'responsibility' as hunters and sportspeople to help support and encourage the next wave of members and hunters into the sport. Be those people our children, the neighbour and/or their children, a new member – young or not such a spring chicken, grandchildren or whoever – our sport is coming under more and more scrutiny all the time so it is with numbers and positive mentoring and unity that we will prosper into the future.

Our annual HUNTS course and Survival Camp were again highlights of the year for many participants and those involved in running them. The HUNTs course had a smaller than usual number and we ran it over a condensed timeframe which worked really well. Special thanks to the team who brought this all together and to the participants who made the most of the valued input that was on offer. The trip culminated again this year with a flyin weekend into the Urewera's in late September amidst glorious weather and saw two animals taken which was a fitting reward for the hard work that was put in. In addition to this, most of the participants have gone on to take other animals since then so keep up the great work. The Survival camp this year was another fitting tribute to Mike Deane and his band of dedicated helpers – not least of all Nigel, Brian, Jos, Dennis, Peter and several other parents and camp leaders that regularly chip in to help out right across the board. This year it was restricted to Club Members only and this paid dividends all round. A really well behaved group of kids, an excellent parent to child ratio and a brilliant atmosphere all round – special thanks to you all for your hugely valued contributions throughout the whole three days.

Given the multi-discipline nature of our NZDA branch and club; it is really heartening to see that we have proven that despite having quite separate interest fields, we all chip in to help each other when major events are being held. This balancing of the workload certainly enables members to participate and enjoy their chosen sports to the fullest when these particular events arise. This is definitely a strength of our club for sure as is the wonderful support that we get from our external sponsors and supporters; and these; as well as those within the branch have been so extremely generous towards the club throughout the year. Huge thanks to you all for your very generous contributions.

Congratulation to Keven Caddy on your nomination and very well deserved Outstanding Citizen Award received from Hauraki District Council in the latter part of last year. It really is such a privilege to have people such as this as a key and pivotal part of our club and committee. Further to this I too was extremely humbled to receive a nomination from TVDA for Service to Sport through Sport Waikato at their annual awards ceremony in November – my commitment to this club, our sporting interests and all that it encompasses has certainly been a passion for me; driven most of all by my desire to help support people getting out into the hills and enjoying all that this has to offer. Thank you all so much once again for your thoughtfulness and support.

Family and friends of our hardworking club and committee members must also be extended a special mention of thanks as your support at home and help with running business and farms in the back ground makes a massive contribution. Please do continue to contact me if you are still experiencing issues or have not received your invoice/renewal or subsequent membership card after having paid many weeks prior. We will get through this and the one thing that I can assure you all, is that your membership at TVDA is fully endorsed, supported and appreciated; and any assistance that you require is always on offer.

It is also time for me to advise that I am happy to do another term in this role if you so wish, but my time to stand aside from this position is also on the horizon. Once again fresh faces and new ideas are essential and it will also free me up to further support others as they work into various roles within the organisation.

The need for this has arisen on couple of fronts but particulary as we are acting as responsible land owners and for the sake of all our members.



International Field Archery Association

World Indoor Competition 2019 - By Sharon Honiss


This was a 20 yard indoor competition held in Wellington ASB Sports Centre in Kilbirnie. This is the first time NZ had ever hosted this World Event. So quite few NZ records were set and many of those were from Lakeview Archers club members.

New Zealand was really well represented and we had 196 competitors from 13 different countries attend.

The event was very well run by the committee and I felt very proud of the event and the performance of our archers.

My friend Christine Finnegan strongly encouraged me to "have a shot – we don't host World Events in NZ very often". So after 5 years of not touching my compound bow, I dusted it off, went out to my club Lakeview Archers, did a couple of "Postal shoots" to qualify for entry to the event, shot 90%+ so figured I would settle in to a couple of months of intense practise, and give myself a fighting chance of scoring credibly. Hhhmmmm.... Well after a couple of weeks of practise, the neck went out so that was 3 weeks rest, said the osteopath. I was slow to return to practise, finally got the bow checked by Attitude Archery, all good to go, got some new arrows and settled in to shooting 20 arrows every 2nd or 3rd day for a couple of weeks. Then its off to Wellington we went. Thank goodness we took my Range Rover as we needed a big boot.

4 of us shared of room. I haven't mentioned names because there were 2 gentle snorers, 1 farter, and me. Thankfully I took my ear plugs LOL!!

Day 1 was practise day that you had to book for when you placed your entry form. I had one practise session but most had two. I limited my arrows to 30 shots....need to save the arm.... Don't want to overdo it!

Then we had 3 days of 60 arrows per day, 5 points maximum per shot = 900 potential

points per shooter for the competition.

Everyone usually did 30 – 40 practise shots each day... I did 5-10 because I was pacing myself, or so I said.

The first shot was a miss – good to get that out of the way so the rest could be "5 pointers".... Yeah right! Day 1 I only shot 87%. I was pretty disappointed. Day 2 started the same way until a fellow competitor pointed out my release aid was

moving. Aaaaahhh so that's why I was almost "punching the release aid" which made me

flinch and miss 6 shots! Mike Lainchbury kindly tightened the loose screw, and away we went. For the second of 30 shots that day my aim improved to 95.33% yaaaay!! My final day was 91% so overall I achieved 90%.

That was good enough to get me a Gold in my division – Female Veteran (over 55) Bowhunter Unlimited.

Lakeview Archers won 6 Gold, 3 Silver and 4 Bronze from 20 shooters.

There were 11 new World Records set by Kiwis.

Of the 196 archers across 70 Divisions, 132 Archers were from NZ.

38 Golds were awarded to NZ Archers of a possible70. Didn't we do well!!



.22 rimfire or smaller	Bolt	No - but note that a magazine that holds more than 10 rounds is prohibited.

.22 rimfire or smaller	Semi-auto	No - if it has magazine holding 10 rounds or less. Yes - if it has a magazine holding more than 10 rounds.
Shotgun	D	Yes - if it is capable of being used with a detachable magazine; or if it has a non-detachable tubular magazine capable of holding more than 5 cartridges.
	Pump	No - if it is not capable of being used with a detachable magazine and it has a non-detachable tubular magazine that is not capable of holding more than 5 cartridges.
Shotgun	Semi-auto	Yes - unless below applies No - if it has a non-detachable tubular magazine that is capable of holding no more than 5 cartridges.

WHAT SHOULD I DO IF I HAVE A PROHIBITED FIREARM?

If you have a firearm, part, or magazine that is now prohibited, you are required store it securely. We also ask you to please complete the notification form below.

We request that people do not hand in firearms to Police at this stage.

Rest in Peace Ian D Wright

Ian passed away last month. He is pictured with his 17pt Red Stag from Clarke River, Haast/Landsborough region, 1962.

The man was from Tuncurry, New South Wales. Ian was an outstanding personality. If you agreed with him you were okay. If you disagreed, make sure your facts were right. Fools fell by the wayside.

He joined Wellington branch



after arriving from Australia in 1953 and remained in touch to the present day, 65 years later. He was one of three influential members, the other two J B Henderson and his life time friend Hong Tse. These three over time were instrumental for many of the hunting benefits we have today.

His enthusiasm for hunting and all things related brought him onto the Wellington branch executive during 1957-59 and President in 1970. He was a National Executive member 1965-70 & 1972-74, elected as a National Life member 1978 and was President 1975 - 77 & 1994 - 95.

As Immediate Past President he persisted with the then executive to prepare a Business Plan for the Association, since then every Conference follows that Plan, a legacy driven by Ian. Conferences were a great place to see Ian perform: "many points of order Mr Chairman" or "do you members know what you are voting for." Ian was not a charm fan when it came to the nitty gritty, he was a master strategist and knew the rules backwards.

He also served as an executive and council member of NZ Mountain Safety Council (1962 - 66), NZ Olympic & Commonwealth Games Association Incorporated, council member 1975 - 77 and was a NZ Shooting Federation inaugural member 1963.

Ian served as a member on the editorial committee, inaugural Arms Code, and minimum safety standards of Range Construction for the New Zealand Police Department subcommittees. In 1981-82 he served on the National Recreational Hunting Advisory Committee to the Minister of Forests.

A final accolade for Ian was the acknowledgement by the NZDA to honour him with the office of National Patron. Not one to let grass grow under his feet, during his tenure of national secretary he developed and edited the "Wild Life" - the first major deerstalkers magazine, since renamed Hunting and Wildlife.

Ian later undertook to research, write and edit the NZDA's History of Hunting, 75 years, published in 2013. Many young outdoors hunters, trampers and climbers, passed through Wellington Branch bushcraft courses under the expert guidance of Ian and other dedicated members.

Aside from deerstalking, other activities lan enjoyed were target shooting, shotgun clay shooting or duck hunting and accumulating his magnificent collection of firearm projectiles, now held by the Heritage Trust.

lan's ability to manufacture rifle stocks from a lump of dried walnut to end up with a presentation grade rifle stock had to be seen to be believed.



Perceived conflicts should not undermine Predator Free NZ

A report claiming that Predator Free NZ could be derailed by conflict over how to maintain biodiversity should not discourage New Zealanders from getting involved in conservation, says Game Animal Council Chair Don Hammond.

"We all want to fundamentally achieve the same outcomes for New Zealand," says Hammond. "In a project as multi-faceted and nationwide as Predator Free NZ there will always be a range of views as to how it should be done."

"Predator Free NZ will be a far more robust and enduring project if the various opinions of the community are taken into account. As the report states, it relies on widespread buy-in from the public, and that cannot be done if certain views are supressed."

Hunters, of course, wish to maintain access to the world-class hunting opportunities that exist in New Zealand and while that may mean at times voicing concern over specific pest control operations, it doesn't mean the sector doesn't support the overall objectives of the programme.

"The Game Animal Council is passionate about preserving and enhancing our native biodiversity and we work constructively with stakeholders such as DoC, OSPRI and ZIP to get the best possible outcomes for both hunting and conservation. Other hunting sector organisations like the Fiordland Wapiti Foundation, the Sika Foundation and NZDA are heavily involved in pest control and are making a very positive contribution to the predator-free goal."

The NZ Game Animal Council is a statutory organisation responsible for the sustainable management of game animals and hunting for recreation, commerce and conservation.
